

- In ancient times, Feng Shui was an important part of Imperial life; only the ruling classes were allowed to use the secrets
- So potent was Feng Shui, that Emperor's guarded their Feng Shui Master jealously
- It is rumored that Feng Shui Masters were responsible for the rise and fall of Chinese Dynasties

- In recent times, when people fled to Hong Kong *(leased by the British for over 100 years)* and Taiwan to escape the oppressive General Mao, many masters preserved this ancient practice
- It is not surprising that these two areas flourished and thrived
- The western world became aware of this powerful knowledge when trade relations developed with SE Asia (*primarily Hong Kong, Taiwan, Singapore and Malaysia*)

- *Feng Shui* is a term dating back to the third century and was first used by Kuo Pu (276-324 CE).
- Feng Shui became a professional skill during the Han Dynasty (206 BCE-220CE)
- Feng Shui addresses three areas of life-wealth, health and relationships


Feng Shui, originally known as 'Kan Yu' is about living in harmony with nature. By living in harmony, man are able to harness the beneficial energies (known as *Chi*) to better their lives.

The Three Types of Luck




Module 1: The Cosmic Trinity

The three types of luck (opportunities), known as Tien-Di-Ren, are Heaven Luck, Earth Luck and Man Luck. Each one of these categories will champion you in a very different way. This aspect of Feng Shui is called the Cosmic Trinity; in other words all three areas will influence your life and living space.





The He Tu and Lo Shu

He Tu and Lo Shu Dragon-Horse & Giant Turtle


These two, very distinct mathematical diagrams representing universal energy are so ancient and intrinsic in the Chinese culture that its people are often referred to as the *He-Luo culture*. Together they form the foundation of Chinese philosophy and are the genesis of Classical Feng Shui.

These famous diagrams are frequently mentioned in ancient Chinese literature and are shrouded by legend and mystery. There are a series of lines connected with black and white dots in both diagrams. Most scholars believe the He Tu chronicles the cycle of birth, while the Luo Shu represents the process of death: yin and yang.

- The Sage Fu Xi discovered this code from the mythical dragon/horse rising out of the Yellow River...known as the HE TU. It was said to be a pattern on its back in the form of yin/yang dots.
- These strange dots/numbers helped understand the cosmic laws of the Universe. Pronounced *Her Too*.
- Fu Xi wanted to ensure that the information was carefully passed down, so he illustrated them into a diagram. It became to be known as the He Tu River Map.



- The He Tu is sometimes called the All Encompassing Knowledge of the Mysterious Map of the Universe (Guang Yi Yu Jo Tu)
- In the He Tu, there are a total of 55 black and white dots representing heaven and earth
- Odd numbers are yang and represent the heaven
- Even numbers are yin and represent the earth



1 & 6 are WATER, same group belong to the North

2 & 7 are FIRE, same Path belong to the South


3 & 8 are WOOD, become friends belong to the East

4 & 9 are METAL, become companions, belong to the West


5 & 10 are EARTH, are the same Route, belong to the Center





In the era of Xia Yu (2205 B.C.) a giant turtle was discovered by Emperor Yu in the River Lo with this arrangement of yin and yang dots. This pattern was represented by numbers...this became the Lo Shu or the Lo Book.





Module 1: The Two Ba Guas

Dates back 6,000 Years

Represents the Perfect World


- The Early Heaven Ba Gua (*Fu Xi* or *Xien Tien Ba Gua*), which dates back approximately 6,000 years, depicts the polarities in nature. It reflects an ideal world of harmony in which chi is in a constant, perfect state of polarization. The eight Guas, or trigrams, create a conceptual model that marks the changes in energy.
- The Early Heaven Ba Gua, representing a 'perfect' world, can be commonly seen over doorways to repel negative energy; used extensively in Westernized styles of Feng Shui. It has more profound implications and uses in Classical Feng Shui as it is the basis of complex formulas, primarily water/road formulas.

Early Heaven Ba Gua

This Ba Gua represents the perfect world, the balance of polarities and is the PRINCIPLES and THEORIES in which Feng Shui is based

It is said that the famous Sage, Fu Xi, arranged the Guas in this order

Fu Xi or the Xien Tien Ba Gua




Later Heaven Ba Gua


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This Ba Gua represents the cycles/seasons of nature, and is the APPLICATION of Feng Shui

King Wen placed the Guas in this arrangement during the Chou dynasty


Ho Tien or the *Wen Wang* Ba Gua





Module 1: The Five Elements

- In traditional Chinese philosophy and metaphysics, everything in the natural world can be classified into one of five categories of chi or movements of energy, known as *Wu Xing* or the *Five Phases*.
- As the case with so many brilliant discoveries, nature was the inspiration. The ancients paid close attention to the consistent and predicable cycles of energy—fire burns wood, and metal comes from the earth.
- By associating this information with the human body and everyday events, the Five Element theory was born. This offered a feasible solution to evaluating the interaction of energy by placing *all* energy into one of the five categories.



Module 1: The Five Elements

Wood Fire Earth Metal Water


- These five elements are metal (jin-literally the word for *gold*), wood (mu), water (shui), fire (ho), and earth (tu). Each element is a representation of matter and energy as it changes from one form to the next.
- Wu Xing simply illuminates the relationship among these types of energy—and is to be understood as both figurative and literal. It is used extensively in many fields of Eastern thought, such as Feng Shui, Chinese astrology, traditional Chinese medicine, and martial arts.
- The Five Elements have **three cycles**—productive, weakening, and controlling. To master Feng Shui, you must master the Five Elements.



This important cycle produces or gives birth to something. Wood feeds fire. Fire produces ash and creates earth. Earth gives birth to metal. Metal melts to a fluid and becomes water, which in turn produces wood.

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Productive Cycle




This process is the reverse of the productive cycle, because what we give birth to weakens us. Wood stokes fire; therefore, fire weakens wood.

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Fire generates ash and creates earth; therefore, earth weakens fire. Earth produces metal; therefore, metal weakens earth. Metal melts to a fluid and produces water; therefore, water weakens metal. Water produces wood; therefore, wood weakens water.

Weakening Cycle



This process is also known as the destructive cycle. Water extinguishes fire, fire melts metal, and metal cuts wood. Wood, in the form of plants or tree roots, controls the earth by breaking it apart or keeping it together. Earth is big enough to hold water—with earth water would have no boundary.
